About the Concert

Lacrymosa - Mozart (from Requiem): This famous movement from Mozart's mighty (and unfinished) Requiem comes from one of the verses of the Dies Irae funeral chant. Mozart's beautiful setting delights in expressive word-painting, with large crying leaps, little dramatic sobs, mighty choral grandstanding, and finally gentle beauty.

Grant Us Thy Peace - Mendelssohn:

Mendelssohn's emotive and elegant setting of this prayer caused Robert Schumann to muse that "...[this] small piece deserves to be world famous and will become so before long."

How Strange Their Ends - Handel: This spectacularly well-written chorus comes from Handel's oratorio *Theodora*, in which the Christian Theodora and her converted Roman lover, Didymus, face martyrdom.

This scene, sung by the chorus of heathens, comments on how strange it is that Theodora and Didymus are both insisting that they be martyred in the place of the other. Handel opens the vocal line with the striking interval of a descending seventh to illustrate the "strangeness", and sets subsequent lines in a flurry of semiquavers to portray the crowd's fervent excitement.

Dies Irae - Michael John Trotta: American composer Michael John Trotta has become popular in the last 20 years for his dramatic yet accessible choral works. This setting of the Dies Irae contrasts flowing legato lines with rhythmic repetition throughout the choir, with a stunning soprano descant soaring above.

Litany for All Souls Day - Schubert: Schubert's setting of Jacobi's beautiful prayer for the souls of the dead manages to be both simple and completely saturated with feeling.

Allerseelen - R. Strauss: At the tender age of 21, Richard Strauss was introduced to the poetry of Hermann von Gilm and created a set of eight songs, originally for tenor. Of these, *Allerseelen*

has become the most famous, with both the vocal line and piano part using rich harmonic devices to express the poignant text of a lover grieving.

Factum est silentium - Philips • Wuthering Heights - Kate Bush (arr. E. Moriarty) • So when the Glitt'ring Queen of Night - Purcell (arr. W McElwee): The works of three great English musicians tied together: from Peter Philip's antiphon for St Michael and All Angels come the echoes and cries of countless angels in heaven watching St Michael warring with the dragon. These transform into the haunting wails of the ghost of Catherine Earnshaw's ghost on the moors of Yorkshire from Emily Bronte's novel Wuthering Heights, whose nocturnal echoes usher in Purcell's melancholic So when the Glitt'ring Queen. This musical eclipse is an allegory on a tyrant's repression on a proud land (in this case: York).

Funeral Ikos - Tavener: John Tavener's thoughtful setting of traditional Greek burial rites is by turns consoling and confronting. The chant-like setting of the verses, interspersed with the harmonised "Alleluia" create a meditative and transcendent listening experience.

O quam gloriosum - Victoria: Spanish priest Tomas Luis de Victoria is known as one of the great mystical composers of the Renaissance. This setting of an antiphon for All Saints Day unfolds in sheer joy at the next life, spent with Christ and the Saints.

Missa Brevis - Kodály: Kodály originally wrote this mass for solo organ in 1942. Hiding in a cellar during the Russian siege of 1945, he revised the work for choir. It received its premiere in the cloakroom of the Royal Opera House in Budapest, as the main hall was too damaged by bombs to be usable. The version of the mass performed today remains true to its origins – the first and last movements are for solo organ, showcasing Kodály's facility in composing for the instrument.
